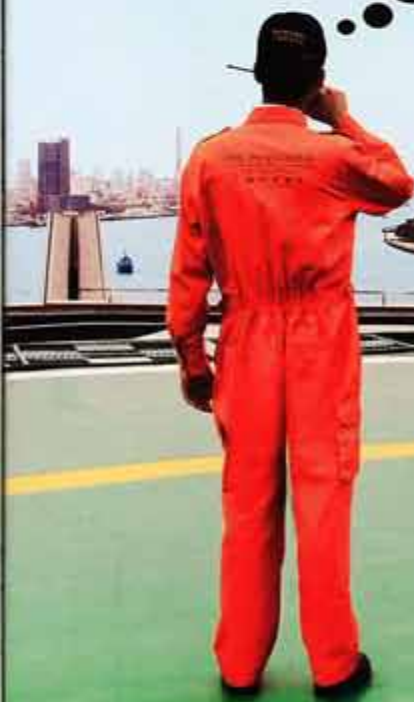

Made of material derived from recycled plastic bottles, the lamp retains its shape without wires or frames, creating a piece that merges minimalism of the past with technology of the future. THE ROLLS-ROYCE OF CRUISE SHIP TERMINALS

Many of the world's starchitects are trying to scale record heights with their buildings in Asia. But Sir Norman Foster is going long, not tall, with his design for the **Kai Tak Cruise Terminal** in Hong Kong—nearly 3,000 feet in length, in fact. Opening in June, Kai Tak will feature high-tech, extra-large gangways, green-certified materials and a 30,000-square-foot roof garden overlooking Victoria Harbor. 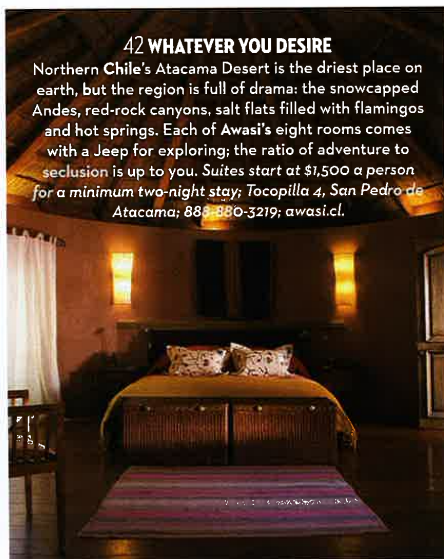
41 UNDER THE VOLCANO

Northern Chile's Atacama Desert is the driest place on earth, but the region is full of drama: the snowcapped Andes, red-rock canyons, salt flats filled with flamingos and hot springs. 43 YOUR OWN PRIVATE ISLAND

Laucala island in Fiji is a former coconut plantation that has been transformed into a private island resort, with a six-to-one staff-to-guest ratio. Perched on the end of a peninsula, the one-bedroom **Peninsula Residence** has an infinity pool overlooking the South Seas and a bathroom with a tub carved out of rock.
